

## KILLED BY THE CARS.

Marshall Reed, of Campbell, Struck  
by a Lackawanna Train.

Marshall Reed, of Campbell, was killed by the westward bound Lackawanna passenger train Tuesday evening, when half way between Curtis and Campbell. He had been to Painted Post in search of work, and was walking home on the track. A freight train was passing east when he was struck, and the noise prevented his hearing the train approaching him from behind. The smoke from the freight engine blew down upon the track so that the passenger engineer did not see him till within ten feet of him. The pilot struck his legs breaking both of them, and he was hurled with such force against the bumper beam, that the back of his head was split off from the neck to the crown, and the brains scattered over the beam, some flying up against the end of the boiler. His body was found against the fence fifteen feet from the track. He leaves a wife and nine children. He had an insurance of \$2,000 in the Knights of Honor. A coroner's jury exonerated the Lackawanna and its employes from all blame.
