
THE SUICIDE OF MRS. LOMBARD.

**Her Husband Had Just Upbraided Her
for Intimacy With Other Men.**

PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—Coroner Holman tonight held a second inquest over the remains of Mrs. C. H. Lombard, who shot herself in her room at The Hill on Sunday evening last. The verdict was the same as the first one, that of suicide. C. H. Lombard, the husband of the dead woman, who did not testify at the first inquest, was placed on the stand. He said:

On the evening of the tragedy I upbraided my wife for being too intimate with a certain young doctor. She fell on her knees before me and promised that she would do better. While I was pacing the floor she went to the adjoining chamber, and going to a chiffonier, took out the revolver. I was horrified at the sight of the weapon, and for a moment could not move. After collecting my thoughts I rushed toward her, but before I could reach her she had fired the fatal shot. I never accused her of being criminally intimate with any one, but on several occasions I have upbraided her for paying too much attention to other men.

The remains will be taken to Seattle tomorrow where the interment will take place.
