

Artistic Dancer Declares Husband Jealous of Her Art

Former Wife of Douglas Crane Now Seeks Divorce From Gay Lombard, Business Man.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5. — Mrs. Ivy-Crane Lombard, who divorced Douglas Crane, the artistic dancer, because he was not enough of a business man, is today seeking divorce from Gay Lombard, a successful business man, because he is not sufficiently artistic.

According to the complaint which Mrs. Lombard filed in the superior court here today, her second husband is entirely wrapped up in his business, and is jealous of her artistic career. He refused, she says, to allow her to entertain her friends, who included many dancers and other persons of artistic bent, and insisted on her entertaining his friends, who, she says, did not share her interests.

Her divorce from Douglas Crane, the dancer, was obtained, on the

ground of failure to provide and desertion.

She was granted her divorce from Crane in 1919, by Superior Judge Edward Mogan, six years after their marriage in New York City. They had separated, she said, in 1917.

According to Mrs. Lombard's present divorce complaint, Lombard entertained the entire cabaret chorus of a local cafe at a party held at their home in the Lombard Apartments, 722 Taylor street. He also refused, she said, to allow 5-year-old Douglas Crane, son of her former husband, to sit at the table with them.

Mrs. Lombard made no request for alimony, but asked division of community property consisting of the Lombard apartments.

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
