Shasta daisies and wild blue phlox, the same flowers used for the wedding of the bride's mother, decorated the chapel. White tapers in tall holders twined with fern formed a background for the bridal party, backed with bamboo. Bouquets of daisies and phlox were caught to the side lights of the chapel, and to the center aisle pews. Among the flowers in the chapel were baskets of lilies, breath of heaven and blue sea holly, sent for the occasion by Henry Field, an uncle of the bride, who has just been nominated for Senator in Iowa, and Mrs. Helen Fischer, an aunt of the bride, from Iowa. Mr. Field was formerly in the seed business, and Mrs. Fischer is a well known landscape architect.
